Program Notes

Frostiana Randall Thompson

Frostiana was commissioned for the 200th anniversary of the incorporation of the Town of Amherst, Massachusetts. Today we will be performing two movements from the seven-movement work. The collection of movements it titled Frostiana as the texts are all poems by Robert Frost.

Cloudburst Eric Whitacre

Cloudburst is a ceremony, a celebration of the unleashed kinetic energy in all things. The mood throughout is reverent, meditative and centered. This does not imply solemn or calm; it simply means the performer must take a spiritual journey with total respect for the power of the water and profundity of the rebirth.

Nukapianguaq arr. Stephen Hatfield

Nukapianguaq (*Noo-kah-pee-ang-gwak*) attempts to present Inuit music in a choral setting that remains as faithful as possible to the aesthetics of the original traditions. Inuit chants are usually reflective in nature and spiritual in intent. They frequently aim at a kind of inner awareness and harmony with life that is comparable to the liturgical music of India and Tibet. The chants do not have lyrics as traditionally, the singers will improvise with verbal sounds that rhyme with the name of the child who is being sung to sleep or the names of the person the singers wish to honor.

Miniwanka, The Moments of Water R. Murray Schafer Miniwanka is an imitative piece describing the various stages of water. The text consists of words for water, rain, stream, river, fog and ocean in the various North-American Indian languages.

The effect of the total piece should be to chronicle the transformation of water from raindrops to streams and waterfalls to quiet lakes to broad rivers, and finally through estuaries to the ocean.

Past Life Melodies Sarah Hopkins

Past Life melodies can be divided into three main sections. The first melody was one that haunted the composer for many years – a melody which came to her at moments of deep emotion.

The second melody reflects her considerable interest in the music of various world cultures, and in this particular case her eight years of residence in Darwin in the north of Australia and her contact with Aboriginal arts and music.

The third section of the work utilizes a concept called harmonicovertone singing, which is as ancient a technique as singing itself. Here the separate harmonic voices weave and dart like golden threads above an earthly drone.
