An Unbroken Thread

The power of melody, from Plainchant to Pop

Singing has been a part of life for thousands of years, evidenced by historic texts and multiple surviving art forms. Beginning with single lines of music ("melody") we communicated with each other and expressed emotion: sadness, joy, pain, love... the list is as endless as the melodies themselves. Even as choral music has developed in complexity, with two, three, four and more harmonic lines adding depth and weight to support the melody, it is still a single sung line that is often the most powerful. In our recital today, we explore two forms of melody that have informed the development of composition over the past 500 years: plainchant and folksong.
