
On behalf of the Native American community and our friends and allies, we invite you to explore the University of Redlands. The generous support of the San Manuel Band of Mission Indians

Support for Native American students

Native Student Programs addresses higher education retention and access issues as they affect Native American college students, youth, and their families in Southern California and beyond. With designated, welcoming spaces in the Hunsaker University Center, Native Student Programs offers an environment that fosters community building, making it easy for students to create a home and find family among their peers. At Native Student Programs, we:

- Advocate for, mentor, and advise Native American students
- Organize events for the local Native community on the University of Redlands campus
- Advise the Native American Student Union, which sponsors traditional activities such as beading, sewing, basket weaving, dance, and games to foster a vibrant Native American community on campus
- Assist Native American freshmen and transfer applicants in the college admissions and financial aid process
- Work directly with the Office of Admissions on outreach efforts
- Provide workshops on college readiness, admissions, financial aid, and more
- Organize campus tours and tribal community visits
- Offer community service opportunities to work with tribal communities

San Manuel Band of Mission Indians Excellence in Leadership Scholarship

At Redlands, more than **90% of students receive financial aid** in the form of scholarships and/or grants each year. Native American students are eligible to apply for the San Manuel Band of Mission Indians Excellence in Leadership Scholarship, a scholarship to help develop future leaders in Native American communities.


Learning at Redlands

The University of Redlands offers a personalized education geared toward students' passions and potential. Students at the U of R can pursue one of **50+ undergraduate and graduate degree programs** and earn an emphasis in Native American studies. For example, a student may major in race and ethnic studies and earn an emphasis in Native American studies.

No matter what their major, minor, or emphasis, Native students may explore Native American topics through the following courses:

- Southern California Indian relationships with the land course
- Native American religions & worldviews course
- Native American women & gender issues course
- Native American environmental issues course
- Native American literature course
- Native American history course

Redlands also offers **part-time undergraduate degree programs** for working professionals in the School of Business, along with traditional graduate programs in Communication Sciences & Disorders, Education, Geographic Information Systems, Music. and Business.
